ichael Gustafson bought his first Nikon camera back in the '70s while in the US Navy and was hooked after shooting the first roll. After leaving the military, he moved to Denver to pursue an education in photography. The emphasis there was on fine art photography, heavily influenced by Ansel Adams, Edward Weston, Brett Weston, and Paul Strand. He sees Eliot Porter as his greatest influence in his personal work.

Most of his experience has been in commercial photography, shooting product shots for catalogs and brochures. His assignments often require architectural and portrait photography.

Over the years he has used a variety of formats, working with view cameras, medium format and 35mm cameras. He started shooting with a digital camera in 1997, and since 1999 the majority of his work has necessarily shifted to digital photography.

In addition to being a practicing photographer, he teaches photography to individuals and groups.

What a great way to spend a cold winter day!

To get the most out of this event, you should have a macro lens, or extension tubes, or close-up lens for your DSLR, or you should have a Macro setting on your point-and-shoot...usually identified by a flower symbol. A tripod will be useful, but not mandatory.

We ask everyone to bring something to shoot and to share. Things like flowers, beads, gears, buttons, small seashells, or anything small that might be of interest. Also, bring along any fabric that would make a good background: black, white, bright colors, multi-colors will all work.

We had a bit of trouble getting items that were brought back to the correct owner, so don't be too attached to the items you bring! Basically, we just put all the stuff on a table, and let people help themselves. Most everything did get back to its owner at the end of the day, but not all.
