
Josh Reeder Getting the "Real" out of People

Josh Reeder GETTING THE "REAL" OUT OF PEOPLE

osh Reeder got his first camera at the age of five—a blue Fisher-Price 110. That camera gave him the foundation for a lifelong interest in photography. Ten years later, while digging around in a closet, he found an Pentax SLR that was older than he was. Three months and 30 rolls of film later, he was ready to upgrade. That's when he knew he wanted to be a professional photographer.

A local photographer gave him private photography lessons and taught Josh rules of composition and the beauty of triangles, as well as how to deveop film and make prints in the darkroom. He offered critiques and encouragement, occasionally using Josh as an assistant.

For three years, Josh worked with Jimmy Abegg at Rocketown Records, who taught him how to get the "real" out of people. Writing on his website, he says of Jimmy, "If you've ever been in a room with him or with a world class photographer, you will realize that what makes them great is how they make people feel on the other end of the lens. It is an art all it's own and the results are magical." When a photographer makes a good connection with the people they are shooting their photos take on a deeper, fuller dimension.

VIVIAN MAIER AT SHERRICK & PAUL THROUGH AUGUST 15

The Sherrick and Paul Gallery is open to the public Thursday–Saturday, 11 am–5pm. The Gallery is located at 438 Houston Street in Nashville. Visit their website at sherrickandpaul.com. Sherrick and Paul Gallery is presenting a collection of works by photographer Vivian Maier. The exhibition of 32 black and white images opened on June 18 and will run through August 15.

Maier was unpublished and unknown as an artist during her lifetime, and has been posthumously compared to well-known mid-20th century masters. The images she captured during her decades in New York and Chicago while working as a nanny are a compelling glimpse into a definitive period of American culture.

Maier's work is distinguished by a particular sense of intimacy with strangers. Her images capture an entire spectrum of expression and gesture in an equally diverse range of subjects, from mink-clad socialites to homeless men.

Maier herself has captivated both art critics and the general public since her vast body of work was discovered in 2007, when the contents of a Chicago storage locker were auctioned off. The unit yielded over 100,000 negatives spanning a period of fifty years. The buyer, John Maloof, began the intensive task of tracking Maier's life, meticulously cataloging her archive and has spent the following years promoting and printing it. When Maier's images and story began appearing online, they quickly went viral. Her street images and self-portraits have since been exhibited in galleries and museums around the world, and have been the subject of two books and a documentary film.
